



Turbulent 19th century Italy is the stage for Shakespeare's tortured tale of one man's self-destruction in his mad quest for power.

Macbeth, the last of William Shakespeare's four great tragedies (Hamlet, King Lear and Othello were the other three) finds new vibrancy in Giuseppe Verdi's stirring opera set during the Italian Risorgimento period that culminated in the unification of Italy. This is an intense, masterful piece of musical drama that unlike many operas, does not center around a love story. Instead, you are taken on a dark, ominous journey and follow Macbeth in his bloody and crazed rise to power. Emboldened by the prophecies of a trio of witches, and encouraged by his wife, Lady Macbeth, Macbeth sets upon claiming his destiny by murder and deceit. Violent and often gruesome, with blood flowing from the castle ramparts, Macbeth is only for the strong-of-heart. But view and hear Macbeth in all of its expressive grandeur, and you will be treated to one of the greatest dramas and psychological stories ever set to opera. You will leave understanding that, "Absolute power corrupts absolutely." This breathtaking new production will be unveiled in May when the Seattle Opera presents the premiere. In this romantic 18th century romp, Figaro and Susanna are to be wed but other hearts must first find contentment in the intrigue-filled royal castle.

Stirred by the majestic music of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and considered one of his greatest achievements, Le Nozze di Figaro (The Marriage of Figaro) follows the escapades of Figaro, the servant of the Count Almaviva and Susanna, the maid of the Countess. The two lovers anxiously plan their wedding day as other romantic mayhem unfolds within the palace walls involving the Count, his wife and page, and Figaro's former landlady. But by the end of the crazy day, Figaro weds his devoted Susanna as the parade of other colorful characters scheme and stumble their way to finding their hearts' desire, too. When this opera first premiered in 1786 in Vienna, it was banned because of its strong political undertones and very-apparent mockery of the aristocracy. Amid Mozart's beautiful score, you will also take delight in the stunningly ornate sets that captures the time period of classical music, from the richly-painted walls and gilded opera right down to the lavish costumes and powdered wigs. 
